



Our Whole Lives—or OWL—is our Unitarian Universalist lifespan sexuality education program that helps participants make informed and responsible decisions about their sexual health and behavior. It equips participants with accurate, age-appropriate information in six subject areas: human development, relationships, personal skills, sexual behavior, sexual health, and society and culture. Grounded in a holistic view of sexuality, Our Whole Lives not only provides facts about anatomy and human development, but also helps participants clarify their values, build interpersonal skills, and understand the spiritual, emotional, and social aspects of sexuality.

The Robert C. Palmer Lecture is Oct. 22: The Robert C. Palmer Lecture on Human Rights will take place Saturday, Oct. 22, 7 p.m. in the sanctuary. The lecture was established in 1983 to honor the Reverend Robert Palmer's service to the church and his extensive social activism on behalf of civil rights, the United Nations and nuclear disarmament. The inaugural speaker in 1983 was the Reverend Kelly Miller Smith, minister of First Baptist Church, Capitol Hill. His church played an important role in training the students who participated in the lunch counter sit-ins at downtown department stores. Other speakers have included Mary Calderone, Abby Rubenfeld, Lionel Barret, Jr., Father Charles Stroebel, the Rev. James Lawson and John Seigenthaler. Last year's speaker was Dr. Lisa Guenther, a philosophy professor at Vanderbilt, who spoke on the need for prison reform.
