Minister's Musings

"I don't know exactly what a prayer is.

I do know how to pay attention, how to fall down into the grass, how to kneel down in the grass."

-from "The Summer Day" by Mary Oliver

After I left my childhood faith at 17, I was quite sure that I did not pray. There was no doubt that I did not pray like the minister did in the church I had attended for 12 years – with lots of verbal confessions of sins committed and righteous deeds undone. Sometimes when I was restless I did pray the way my mother taught me to before I went to sleep: "God Bless



Mommy, God Bless Daddy' and then down the list of my siblings. I could keep adding people until the words calmed me enough to fall asleep.

I was surprised when a decade later my Unitarian Universalist minister, Doris Hunter, suggested that I did pray. Her comment seemed to come out of nowhere – we weren't talking about prayer, we were talking about the long days I spent in my sculpture studio. There I would work with the materials without a goal. I lost all sense of time and images evolved as I worked. I was shocked at the idea that this had anything to do with prayer – where did she come up with this stuff? She said that many world religions - including Christianity, Shinto and Buddhism which she taught about at a local college – traditionally used prayers with words and prayers without words. The Christian religion calls them Kataphatic and Apophatic prayers. The prayers I heard in church when I was a child were Kataphatic - they had content using words, images, symbols and ideas. In her opinion, I was engaged in Apophatic prayer in my studio. Apophatic prayer is when one empties one's mind of words and images and is simply present: present to God or Jesus if you were Christian; present to the Kami or nature spirits if you were Shinto; present to 'nothingness' if you were Buddhist.

In the years since, I have learned that people pray in many different ways for a great variety of purposes – so many ways that you could argue the word 'prayer' is meaningless. Yet I have come to find meaning in the word and even would agree with Doris that I was praying a lot in my art studio. In the month ahead, I look forward to hearing if, how, when and why you pray, mediate or pay attention, so that we can unpack this vast range of human practice together.



Safe Haven

Did you know that families with children make up 32% of the homeless population? The Children's Program at Safe Haven added new programs and services in 2015. The partnership with the Vanderbilt Child Language and Literacy Lab provides access to free evaluations in the areas of speech, language, literacy, math and/or thinking skills. The recommendations provided following the evaluations can then be reviewed by the child's school, and if an IEP is created, that plan will follow the child regardless of where he or she moves. Another new partnership is with the Nashville Public Library's Puppet Truck program. The Puppet Truck travels to Safe Haven about once a month to provide a free puppet show, a big hit with the children!

From the Board of Directors President

Thanks to everyone who showed up for our mid-year congregational meeting last month. About 100 people attended. The congregation approved minutes from last June's meeting and the Nominating

Committee's slate of appointments. The Finance Committee recommended some changes to this year's budget, which also passed. We don't always have a mid-year budget adjustment, but the committee felt it was important this year because of some fairly significant changes in how operating revenue and expenses are going. For instance, the current-year pledges and auction fundraiser revenue numbers are lower than posted in the original budget, as are some staffing and administrative costs. The net result is that we will be using more operating reserves (our monthly "cushion") than we planned. However, under this new budget those operating reserves will stay above the \$25,000 minimum specified in our financial policies.

This August, the **Rev. Gail Seavey** will be taking a 6-month sabbatical. This leave is spelled out in the letter of agreement between Gail and FUUN, which states sabbatical time is "for study, education, writing, meditation, and other forms of professional and religious growth." The Board and the Committee on Ministry is developing plans to cover Gail's duties and responsibilities while she is gone.

From the Safe Congregation Panel

Update on Policies and Healing

In December, there was an incident in the social area between services involving **Jim Seavey** and **Tom Surface**. Unfortunately, emotions got heated and two people who have given so much to this church were wounded. The Safe Congregation Panel (SCP) exists because conflict is normal and expected. What is not normal is the way in which these two men came together to listen intently and openly. They learned a lot about each other and laid a foundation to rebuild trust in their relationship. The Rev. **Jason Shelton** and I witnessed the soul-searching work Jim and Tom undertook to repair the harm. It was a beautiful demonstration of our values: "to forgive and be forgiven; to touch and be touched."

For anyone who witnessed the incident, please know that it has been addressed to the satisfaction of the parties involved. We are also comfortable that it is not likely to recur. If you have concerns you would like to discuss, please contact **Jason Shelton** for pastoral care or a member of SCP for input on our process.

When incidents occur, it is best if policies and procedures are already in place so we are not scrambling during a crisis. The policies administered by SCP were recently updated. Members of the Safe Congregation Panel Policy Review Team are: Alan Leiserson, Doug Pasto-Crosby, Stacey Smith, Nancy Stott, and Vicky Tataryn, Board Liaison. When you see them, please offer your gratitude for their time, knowledge, and devotion to this important, yet tedious task. The task force made recommendations which the Board adopted for the following policies: Honoring the Children Policy, Policy Against Discrimination, Policy Against Sexual Harassment, Disruptive Behavior Policy, and Complaint Procedure. 

Zen Shorts, By Jon J. Murth, A 2006 Caldecott Honor Book In conjunction with this month's theme of prayer/meditation/equanimity, I highly recommend Zen Shorts by Jon J. Murth. Zen is the Japanese word for meditation and "Zen shorts" are brief meditations encouraging us to reconsider our thoughts, fears, and desires. With gentle wisdom and a "slight panda accent," Stillwater the panda tells three siblings stories relating to each of their lives. The stories, using three Zen parables, encourage them to view their world and each other with a fresh outlook. Without being preachy, he addresses giving, luck, and forgiving.

In their time together, Stillwater tells Addy about his uncle who gave gifts to a robber who broke into his home. Michael hears about a farmer who knows luck can be neither judged nor predicted. Might be good luck, might be bad. Karl, who is very angry with his brother, is told the tale of a monk who learns that forgiveness can help him bring calm to his world.

I applaud this book as a platform for discussion with children aged three through 13.

Sanctuary of Light Imbolc Celebration with SPIRAL

Jan. 30, 6 p.m. – 9 p.m., Morgan House Ritual will begin at 6:30 PM

Special guest, Christina Beard-Moose, PhD, of Suffolk County College in New York, channels the Goddess Bridget and will present a slide show of the sacred places she has recently visited in Ireland. We ask a donation fee of \$5 to cover the cost of her plane tickets from New York.

Imbolc, also called Bridget's Day, is a celebration of the coming of spring when plants begin to break through the earth and the animals in their dens stir. This is the time of year when we invite Bridget into our homes to protect us. She is the Celtic goddess of poetry, smithing, medi-

cine, arts and crafts, cattle and other livestock, sacred wells, serpents (in Scotland) and the arrival of early spring.

Imbolc legend says when the Cailleach - the divine hag of Gaelic tradition - gathers her firewood for the rest of the winter and wishes to make the winter last a good while longer, she will make sure the weather on Imbolc is bright and sunny, so she can gather plenty of firewood. Therefore, people would be relieved if Imbolc is a day of foul weather, as it means the Cailleach is asleep and winter is almost over. At Imbolc on the Isle of Man, where she is known as Caillagh ny Groamagh, the Cailleach is said to take the form of a gigantic bird carrying sticks in her beak. (Groundhog Day anyone?)

We will make Bridget dolls which you can take home and





place on your hearth, over your door or in a place of honor to invite her into your home.




